200 Miles Away...

The stones used for the Osireion can be found in Aswan, which is situated 200 miles to the south.





"The location of the Osireion in the temple of Sethos I (Seti I) at Abydos ... is due to the proximity of a natural spring. This seems to have been used to provide a pool of water around the subterranean 'grave' in order to make it a model of the mythical mound of creation which the Egyptians believed rose from the primeval waters."

The resemblance in construction methods among these megalithic sites raises the question of whether, at the time of the Tower of Babel, when people were dispersed and languages evolved, they carried their architectural expertise with them.



Is the Osireion Pre Flood?



The identities of Nimrod and the Egyptian deity Osiris have been established, revealing that Osiris experienced a violent demise, which became the core theme of Egyptian idolatry. If Osiris is indeed Nimrod, then the tragic death that the Egyptians mourned during their annual celebrations corresponds to the death of Nimrod. Various accounts of the death of the god revered in the mysteries across different cultures consistently reflect this notion. A remark from Plato suggests that during his time, the Egyptian Osiris was considered synonymous with Tammuz.

The veneration of Osiris took place following the scattering from the Tower of Babel. While constructing the temple of Seti the First, the Egyptians discovered the ancient Megalithic Structure and referred to it as the Osireion.

Change in Plans...

Most scholars suggest that the Osireion was started by Seti I and finished by his grandson. However, Egyptologist John Anthony West argues for an earlier construction date based on several observations. The Osireion's elevation is nearly fifty feet lower than Seti I's temple, the layout of Seti's temple forms an unusual L-pattern, and there is a chamber for Osiris within Seti's temple. West posits that the original plan for Seti's temple was a straight rectangle, but the discovery of the Osireion during construction led to changes in the design and integration of the Osireion into the overall site.

Perversion of God's Plan...

Giza became the greatest monument to Osiris ever built, but Abydos continued as a primary location for the Osiris cult and his related rituals and festivals. Perhaps the most important of these festivals was the Festival of Khoiak, held in the fourth month of the season of Akhet (Inundation). The high point of the ritual was a three-day reenactment of the myth of Isis and Osiris, and the death of Osiris at the hands of Set. One the third day Osiris is reborn.

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Much of what we know of this early "Passion Play" comes from the "Stela of Ikhernofret"
